Begin Circle of Influence

I first heard of the National Christian College Athletic Association (NCCAA) and its member institution, Indiana Wesleyan University (IWU), through a prison ministry that was taking place in my hometown of Mansfield, Ohio. IWU's soccer team came over to Mansfield when I was a sophomore in high school to minister to the inmates. My family housed players from the team. At that time I met the head men's soccer coach, who would begin making a tremendous impact on my life.

I maintained contact with the coach throughout my junior and senior years of high school as IWU would continue their ministry at the prison playing against the inmates. Although I had offers from several other colleges, I wanted to obtain a degree from an NCCAA Division I Christian college. Because of the impact the IWU team had on me, I chose to attend Indiana Wesleyan University and played on the men's varsity soccer team.

However, this was also a time in my life that I was facing some struggles. I had begun to let my ego get the best of me and began a drug addiction. My drug use began when I was a junior in high school and remained until I was a sophomore at IWU. However, my coach continued to witness to me and be a role model for me to follow.

Even though I had always known Christ as my personal Savior, I was a lukewarm Christian at best ("So then, because you are lukewarm, and neither cold nor hot, I will vomit you out of My mouth." – Revelation 3:16). Not only did my grades suffer as I began my education at IWU, but so did my physical conditioning level and playing time for the soccer team. My caliber of play was not what it could have been, and I knew it. Most of all, my spiritual conditioning was on the path to eternal destruction. I was not able to give my best – to my education, my team, my coach, my family, nor my God.

My sophomore year was one of life-changing proportions. The NCCAA and IWU helped me to turn my life around through the emphasis of Christ through athletics. I played in the NCCAA national soccer tournament at Lee

University in Tennessee. The NCCAA had invited Michelle Akers Stahl of the USA national women's soccer team to speak at the national tournament banquet. Her message and testimony helped me realize where I was spiritually and to determine where I wanted to go with my life and career. I came to realize that I didn't have to take drugs or drink to play at the top level. For some reason I had thought that the two went hand in hand. As I recommitted my life to God, I began to excel in the various areas of my life, including athletics. My junior year at IWU brought another chance to play at the NCCAA national soccer tournament at LeTourneau University in Texas, followed by completing my college career at the NAIA regional my senior year, receiving honors both years.

The Lord allowed my experiences to shape who I am and what I do today. Following graduation I pursued a field of substance abuse counseling in which I received certification at the CCDC I level to complement my bachelor of science degree in psychology from IWU. For three years following my graduation, I served as a primary counselor for alcoholics and addicts in a detoxification unit in a hospital while coaching soccer at the high school level. Although I was coaching, I missed the NCCAA and the Christian college environment.

Knowing the impact the NCCAA had on my life, I began searching the NCCAA web site and found a job with an NCCAA member institution, Greenville College, where I could enjoy serving as both head men's soccer coach and substance abuse counselor. God has certainly led me here, allowed me to use my experiences to help others, and topped it off by allowing me to use athletics to impact the lives of student-athletes, hopefully continuing the circle in my life.

Will you assist the NCCAA in their ministry? It made a difference in my life and now I am continuing the circle by impacting the lives of my student-athletes. Your prayers and financial gifts make a difference.

Brian McMahon is in his eleventh year as head men's soccer coach and ninth year as head women's soccer coach at Greenville College. Now in his 19th year of coaching soccer, McMahon has coached in the club, high school, and collegiate settings.

In McMahon's tenure at Greenville he has recorded 214 wins in 10 seasons. In addition under McMahon's direction he has coached 17 NCCAA All-Americans, 85 SLIAC All-Conference performers, 17 NCAA All-Region, 2 NCAA Academic All-Americans, and 9 Professional Development Players. In 2004 senior Seth Huber (Coffeen, IL, HS) was named the Kyle Rote Jr. Award winner which is given to the outstanding national player of the year.

In 2008 and 2010 McMahon led his men's team to the SLIAC conference tournament championship and qualified for the NCAA National Tournament.

The 08 team was the first team of any sport in Greenville's history to qualify for the NCAA National Championship Tournament.

Since 2003 McMahon's men's team has compiled a record of 115 W – 57 L – 21 T while the past three seasons under his direction the women have a 58 W – 22 L record. The past 4 years McMahon has led his men's team to 4 national championship tournaments with the 07 and 09 teams qualifying for the NCCAA National Tournament while the 08 and 10 teams competed in the NCAA National Tournament before losing to Loras University who went on to the NCAA Final Four. The past 5 years McMahon's teams have been both regionally and nationally ranked by both the NSCAA/NCAA and the NCCAA.

As a player, McMahon competed at Indiana Wesleyan University where he received NCCAA regional and national honors. During his 4 years at IWU he competed in the NAIA regional final four two times while also qualifying twice for the NCCAA National Tournament and winning the MCC conference regular season and conference championship two times. He also was given the

opportunity to compete in England, Ireland, and North Ireland with Athletes in Action following his career.

McMahon graduated from Indiana Wesleyan University in 1998 with a Bachelor of Science degree in psychology. Following graduation, McMahon earned his certified chemical dependency counselor (CCDC) license while counseling juvenile delinquents in a treatment facility. In 2002, he completed a master's degree in sports psychology at Southern Illinois University Edwardsville.

In addition to his coaching responsibilities, McMahon serves as the SLIAC men's soccer chair, serves on the NCAA Central Region Ranking Committee, serves as the NCCAA Regional Chair, serves as the NCCAA National Vice Chair and also serves on the NSCAA central region ranking committee.

McMahon currently resides in Greenville, IL with his wife Jen who also works at the college as the assistant director for freshman admissions. They have four children: MacKenzie, twins Abigail and Keegan and Ally Parker.

coach McMahon create a very competitive and nationally recognized program over the past 6 years. Now in his 11th year of coaching soccer, Wardlaw has coached at the club, high school, and collegiate levels.

As Associate Head Coach, Wardlaw serves as a coaching director, primary recruiting coordinator, and assists coach Mac in day to day operations

and player development of both men's and women's programs.

As a player, Wardlaw competed at the University of the Cumberlands in Williamsburg, KY. While there he captained a #1 ranked team in the NCCAA and two national tournament berths and also competed in the NAIA regional finals twice losing both times to eventual national champions Lindsey Wilson. While at the University of the Cumberlands he was a two year captain and received all-conference honors. As a young player Wardlaw competed in national championships with Team KC, a premier club in the Kansas City area.

Wardlaw received his bachelor of arts in psychology from MidAmerica Nazarene University in 2000. After graduation, he worked as

a supervisor and team leader at TLC for Children and Families, a boys' and girls' home in Olathe, KS. Wardlaw also completed his master of arts in teaching from Greenville College in 2008.

Wardlaw is also the owner of Southern Illinois Happy Soccer Feet and Legends which is a program that goes to Preschools and child daycare centers and introduces "story time with a soccer ball." It introduces advanced balance and physical skills in the most fun way while bringing joy, confidence, and self-concept. Happy Feet participants graduate into Southern Illinois Legends, a soccer club which develops creative, brave, risk takers for life.

Jon Fields is entering his third season as assistant men's and women's soccer coach and at Greenville College. Now his 5th year of coaching, Fields has coached at club, high school, and collegiate

settings. Fields has also taken on a new role for the programs stepping in as the Strength and Conditioning coach as well as assistant coach. Within that role, players will receive an intense program that will not only prepare them physically for the season but mentally as well.

He will also work with training the goalkeepers and the defenders to solidify the back lines for both programs.

As a player, Fields experienced success at Greenville College competing in two SLIAC conference tournament championship matches as well as four NCCAA Division I Regionals. Fields shined as a defender who, over his career at Greenville, received All-Conference, NCCAA All-Region, and NCCAA All-American honors. From 2003-2006, Fields helped lead his team to four winning season records, lead the nation with lowest goals against average at 0.64, and was ranked as high as 6th in the nation in the NCCAA. Prior to coaching at Greenville, Fields

worked as a Program Director for the Grant County Family YMCA in Marion, IN. In that role, he was in charge of managing all the sports programs throughout the facility working with children as young as kindergarteners to adults. Fields was the Head Boys Soccer Coach of Oak Hill High School (Marion, IN) in 2008 where he led his team to a 14-3 record. He also coached for the Marion Lightning Premiere Club (Marion, IN) working with U10-U13 ages.

Fields is a 2007 graduate of Greenville College, completed a Bachelor of Science degree in business management and is currently working on his masters of arts in teaching at Greenville College.

Dr. Robert Johnson has served as an assistant men's soccer coach at Greenville College since 2001. He has been primary coach of the men's soccer reserve team since 2010.

Dr. Johnson returned to Greenville College in 1987 as the head cross country and track and field coach and served in the position until 1994. In 1994, he became head women's soccer coach and directed the program until 2001. Since relinquishing his position as a head coach, he

has focused his attention on his positions as an assistant coach for the men's soccer and men's and women's track and field programs. In men's soccer, he has been a member of the coaching staff for teams that advanced to the 2008 and 2010 NCAA Division III national tournament and the 2007 and 2009 NCCAA national tournament. In 2008, 2009, and 2010, Johnson coached national champions in the 110-meter hurdles at the NCAA Division III national championships. He also coached Edgar Townsend to a national championship in the 55-meter hurdles in the 2010 NCAA Division III indoor championships.

The St. Louis Intercollegiate Athletic Conference honored him in 2011 as the second recipient of

the Lee McKinney Distinguished Service Award in recognition of his career accomplishments. In 2012, Dr. Johnson will be inducted into the Greenville College Athletic Hall of Fame in the coach category. With his vast knowledge and attention to technique, he has assisted in many areas of the soccer and track and field programs and is often seen working with javelin throwers.

A Greenville graduate who played for the men's soccer program, "Dr. J," as he is affectionately known, is an exercise physiologist who also serves as a professor in the Health, Physical Education and Recreation Department. He and wife Carol have two adult sons and five grandchildren.

Jameson Ramirez is the latest addition to the Greenville men's soccer coaching staff.

Having joined in 2010, Ramirez will be serving as an assistant coach for the men's reserve team. His principle duties will

include working with the goalkeepers as well as providing general technical and logistical

assistance to reserve team head coach Robert Johnson.

This will be Ramirez's second year coaching. Ramirez graduated with honors from Greenville College in 2007 with a bachelor of arts degree in sociology. In August of 2010, Ramirez earned his master's degree in sociology from Southern Illinois University Edwardsville.

Born and raised in the Central American country of Guatemala, Ramirez started playing soccer (or 'futbol' as it more commonly referred to) from the early age of three. As a player Ramirez

was brought up in the reserve team system of Guatemalan first division team Coban Imperial, earning his way to a spot on the first team. In 2002 he chose to come to the United States for school where he eventually played high school and club ball in Harrisburg, PA.

In 2003, Ramirez joined the ranks of the Greenville College men's soccer team where he successfully played several seasons, assuming captaincy of the team in 2006 and garnered several accolades that included team all-conference selections.



MEN'S SEASON PREVIEW

GREENVILLE, Ill. – After four consecutive appearances in a season-ending national tournament, the Greenville College men's soccer is primed to make 2011 just as successful as their previous four campaigns as head coach Brian McMahon returns six all-conference performers to the squad this year.

Greenville is set to return after a fantastic 2010 season in which they went 15-6-2, claimed the SLIAC regular season and tournament championships, and earned a berth in the NCAA championship tournament. On top of that, the Panther squad graduated only five seniors and returns the bulk of their starting 11 from a year ago.

The Panthers appeared in the NCCAA national tournament in 2007 and 2009. They qualified as SLIAC tournament champions for the NCAA Division III national championships in 2008 and 2010.

GC soccer seems poised for another big year and will be driven by a balanced core, both on and off the field.

"[The] older [players] know that we have a lot riding on this year," commented senior striker Daniel Taylor. "For many of us this is our last time wearing the GC jersey, and the whole team has bought into the need to play every game with real urgency and desire. We are stoked for 2011."

Offensively, Greenville will be led by first team all-conference returning seniors Taylor, David Dunlop, and Cobi Allen. First team all-conference junior Nathan Mayberry also returns. Junior midfielders Matt Cowman and Dan Ruder will help solidify an experienced unit in the middle.

Dunlop, also an NCCAA all-American selection in 2010, led the Panthers in goals (13), assists (11), points (37), and shots (79) in last season's campaign, helping the Black & Orange outscore their opponents 64-25.

Defensively, GC will return honorable mention all-conference junior goalkeeper Nathan Haas and will look to juniors Sean McQuillan and second team all-conference junior Steve Beam to keep the opponents offense in check.

"We have high hopes for 2011," stated McMahon. "We will be very talented this year and are excited to see where the season takes us."

Greenville College men's soccer will kick off the 2011 campaign on Saturday, Aug. 27, as they host the GC Alumni in their annual scrimmage. The Panthers will start regular season action on Thursday, Sept. 1, when they travel to Belleville, Ill. to play Lindenwood.

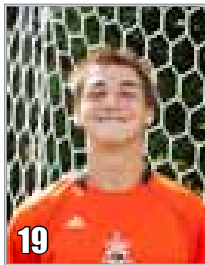

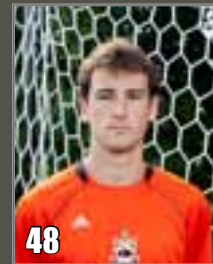

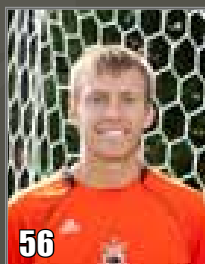

WOMEN'S SEASON PREVIEW

GREENVILLE, Ill. – The 2011 Greenville College women's soccer team is looking to continue their stretch of four consecutive seasons of winning 14 or more games as they enter the new campaign. The 2010 team was one win away from qualifying for the NCAA Division III national tournament as they came up short in the SLIAC tournament championship game.

The 2010 SLIAC runner-up will be looking to dominate 2011 with talent, depth, a terrific recruiting class, and a host of capable senior leaders.

In their 2010 season, the women posted an overall record of 14-7-2, with a home record of 8-2-1. They tied for second in SLIAC regular season action, earning the second seed in the SLIAC tournament. Though the majority of the season was filled with success, including the first SLIAC tournament win in school history, the squad was bested in the SLIAC championship game by Principia 5-1, before dropping a close 1-0 match against Trinity International in NCCAA regional play.

"Last year's SLIAC championship tournament defeat and NCCAA regional tournament exit left some feelings of unfinished business," commented senior midfielder Jamie Hoag. "We are excited for the chance to compete this year."

The Panthers will look to 2010 first team all-conference performers Maureen Murphy and Rachel Irwin to lead the squad in 2011. Both women started all 23 games for GC a year ago and will

provide experience in the offensive attack.

Murphy, a sophomore, is the leading returning scorer from a year ago as she racked up eight goals and 10 assists in earning the SLIAC Newcomer of the Year Award.

Irwin, a senior and a 2010 SLIAC all-sportsmanship team member, posted eight goals and five assists.

Seniors Hoag and Rachel Zahniser will also help guide the team's offense throughout the season.

Defensively, GC will start sophomore honorable mention all-conference goalkeeper Heidi Koehl. Koehl played in 22 games in 2010, posting an .840 save percentage with a goals against average of 1.24. Her record was 13-6-2 with four shutouts. Greenville will rely on a majority of newcomers to help defend the opposition.

"Our women are poised for a big year," stated head coach Brian McMahon. "We will be tested early in our Texas road trip, but I am confident that our ladies will answer the call throughout the season."

Greenville College women's soccer will begin the 2011 season on Thursday, Sept. 1, as the team travels to Belleville, Ill., to battle Lindenwood.

John M. Strahl Athletic Complex

A 14-acre area just one mile south of the main campus, the complex was dedicated to former coach and athletic director John M. Strahl in April 2004. The complex includes Francis Field, Lady Panther Field, Robert E. Smith Field, S.W. Andrews Fields, and the Briner Training Center.



in honor of Dr. Robert A Briner during the 2004-05 school year. The interior features batting cages, an artificial turf flooring, and an area for pitching.

Francis Field

Francis Field consists of separate home venues for football and soccer. The Panther football field was completed in 1987 just before the Panther football team began their first season. The stadium can seat up to 2,000 fans. Greenville also sports an all-weather track which was completed in 1985. The soccer field was completed in the mid-1960's. Recent improvements have included installation of new Bermuda grass, team benches on the east side of the field, a new kicking wall, bleachers seating 500, and a new press box.



Fitness Training Center

The fitness center includes an indoor lap pool, cardio equipment, weight training machines, free weights and aerobics room. A sauna and jacuzzi are available in the men's and women's locker rooms.



E.G. Burritt Gymnasium

The original home court of the Panther basketball teams was built in 1915 and named for Greenville's third president, Eldon G. Burritt. This gym doesn't see the action it used to, but it still serves a purpose. Features include a climbing wall, training equipment, and a classroom.

H.J. Long Gymnasium

Greenville built the historic H. J. Long Gymnasium in 1961. Named for the college's fifth president, the gym seats 2,000 enthusiastic Panther fans as they cheer for the volleyball and men's and women's basketball teams. The building also houses locker rooms, training facilities, and coaching and administrative offices.



Lady Panther Field

Lady Panther Field, home of the softball team, boasts of a skinned infield, 200 foot fence enclosing the field, brick dug-outs and ample practice space. With its new scoreboard, new press box, new outfield fence, revamped dugouts, and sound system, the facility is one of the most enjoyable places to play softball in the conference.

Robert E. Smith Field

Dedicated to Greenville's ninth president on October 12, 1985, the Panther baseball field is one of the best around. It's located next to the football and soccer fields in the John M. Strahl Athletic Complex only one mile south of campus.

S.W. Andrews Fields

Located within the John M. Strahl Athletic Complex, S.W. Andrews Fields consist of two 80-yard by 120-yard irrigated soccer fields and a 100-space parking lot. The facility was completed in 2006 to serve as the primary practice facility for the men's and women's soccer programs.

Briner Training Center

The Briner Training Center houses indoor practice facilities for baseball, softball, and track and field. The 12,000 square foot facility was named

Glen and Maxine Crum Recreation Center

Completed in 1993 as part of Greenville's 100th Anniversary and named for generous Greenville donors, Glen and Maxine Crum, in 1998, the Recreation Center serves a wide variety of purposes. The building houses athletic offices as well as flexible facilities that can be converted into two tennis courts, batting cages, basketball courts, volleyball courts. It also contains an indoor walking track and serves as a training facility for multiple athletic teams.



Scott J. Burgess Tennis Complex

The GC tennis complex includes six courts. The first two courts were built in the 1940's, the second two in 1973, and the last two were completed in 1995. The courts were dedicated by Stan Smith in November 1974 in memory of Scott J. Burgess, a GC basketball player who died while still a student. The men's and women's Panther tennis teams are not the only teams to call these courts home. The local high school teams use them as well.
